S\$3M TO HELP SHIPPING COMPANIES DEFRAY ACCOMMODATION, MEDICAL & TRAINING COSTS FOR SEAFARERS







OS marked its anniversary with a special gift that warms the hearts of seafarers and the shipping community.

"SOS will be committing S\$3 million over the next two years to take care of the welfare of our seafarers in the areas of accommodation, medical and training," Guest-of-Honour Mr Chan Chun Sing, Minister in Prime Minister's Office and NTUC Secretary-General (SG), announced to a jubilant crowd at the 45th and 22nd anniversaries of SOS and Seacare.

The Seacare Sailors' Home Scheme (SSS), Seacare Medical Scheme (SMS) and Seacare Maritime Training Scheme (SMTS) will each receive an additional S\$1 million fund from SOS, starting from 2017.













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Presently, the SSS, SMS and SMTS offer members and/or shipping companies complimentary accommodation at The Seacare Hotel in Singapore and Seacare Sailors' Home in Manila, Philippines; free medical examinations at The Seacare Maritime Medical Centre in Singapore and appointed clinics in Malaysia, Indonesia and the Philippines; and training grants for Union-approved courses.

The S\$3 million funding will improve the schemes' current benefits. It is part of the Union's efforts to curb the global downturn by helping shipping companies defray overheads while preserving members' employment security.

Organised at the Resorts World Convention Centre on 1 December 2016, the joint anniversary celebrations drew more than 1,000 members, SOS and Seacare staff, tripartite partners and foreign delegates from around the world. A cake-cutting and champagnetoasting ceremony, complete with a grand lucky draw, boosted the festive mood.

The welcome address was delivered by SOS President Mohamad Abu Bakar who outlined SOS and Seacare's rich histories and noteworthy accomplishments.

Special Guest Mr Stephen Cotton, International Workers Transport Federation (ITF) General Secretary, paid tribute to SOS's compassion for all seafarers. "The Union didn't surrender during the economic crisis in the '80s. It set up Seacare to ensure that seafarers who had lost their jobs could be integrated into society once again," he said. "SOS is straightforward and honest in its negotiations, both within and beyond the maritime industry."

SSS GETS BIGGER AND BETTER







The Maritime Hall

mplemented in 2008, the Seacare Sailors' Home Scheme (SSS) is an ongoing initiative by SOS that caters to the accommodation needs of its local and international members and the shipping community. Since 2013, the Union has been handing out an annual S\$250,000 worth of hotel-only vouchers, for free accommodation at The Seacare Hotel, to shipping companies that have Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBAs) with SOS and are participating in the SSS.

Other benefits include 5-nights of fully subsidised accommodation for SOS members at the Citin Seacare Hotel in Kuala Lumpur and the Seacare Sailors' Home in Mandaluyong City, Philippines, and free services provided to international seafarers at the Seacare Drop-In Centre, which is located at Singapore's Pasir Panjang Terminal Building.

Starting 1 January 2017, S\$1million worth of multi-purpose vouchers will be given to CBA shipping companies over the next two years to further reduce their accommodation expenditures.

These multi-purpose vouchers entitle CBA shipping companies to free accommodation at The Seacare Hotel, and free usage of the hotel facilities for their training, seminar, workshop and corporate functions.

The enhanced SSS will entitle SOS members to 8 nights of free accommodation in a standard room per year, at any of the eight SOS-owned hotels worldwide - The Seacare Hotel in Singapore, Citin Seacare Pudu Hotel in Kuala Lumpur, The Victoria Hotel in Manchester, The Big Sleep Hotels in Cardiff, Cheltenham and Eastbourne, Columba Hotel in Inverness, and Best Western Plus Milford Hotel in Leeds. This is an extension of the 5-nights free hotel stays offered to SOS members since December 2014. The free accommodation aims to promote family bonding for members and their families.

ITF ASIA PACIFIC REGIONAL CONFERENCE

SOS General Secretary (GS) Kam Soon Huat and Assistant Treasurer Sharon Li attended the conference.

P2C, which directs all ITF regions towards building union power, ensures that the priorities and approach of each part of the ITF fits the Union's 4-lever global strategy on organising key hubs and corridors; focusing on key industry players; activating mass union membership; and following geographic shift.

The APRC is the first time the affiliates have met since a review of

the Asia Pacific was carried out by a steering group of regional executive board members and staff to adjust priorities, governance and staffing. Through the conference, affiliates could evaluate the implementation of the congress's decisions and regional work programme, as well as discuss future trends and prepare for imminent challenges in 2018 onwards.

As a member of the steering group, Sharon, who is also co-chair of the ITF Young Transport Workers Committee and women's committee member, reported on the outcomes of the Asia Pacific regional review, and took questions from the floor. She also chaired the Young Workers' Fringe session - Engaging Youth for Stronger Unions, before presenting her report of the fringe event to the conference floor. Sharon highlighted, "We have identified exactly what we should be focusing on, where the energy in the region should lie. We have been able to look at how we incorporate women and youth into our priority projects to make sure there is engagement at grassroots level."

"For effective unionism on the ground, we have to engage from the bottom up, while still maintaining strong leadership in critical areas of research and communication. The campaigns aren't confined to one religion or country," said ITF President and National Secretary of the Maritime Union of Australia (MUA) Paddy Crumlin. "Across the region it's a time of huge challenges for workers, but also opportunities. We need to look at our collective response to the way technology is impacting our work...to make sure we're focusing our energy in the right places to build worker power regionally and feed our regional successes into a thriving global ITF."

CONNECTING AT ITF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

wo fruitful meetings, one zeroed in on the young transport workers while the other focused on the women, were organised by the International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) in the month of October last year in Panama City, Panama.

bout 25 committee members from different parts of the world showed up for the ITF Young Transport Workers Committee meeting on 23 and 24 October 2016, where they discussed reports on activities held in various regions, such as the network-building workshops in Asia Pacific and Africa.

The members were also given an update of the ITF Young Workers Programmes for 2017 to 2018, which include supporting and linking with the ITF Projects and strengthening the network among the young workers.

The meeting concluded with a planning session on the upcoming ITF Young Transport Workers Conference in March 2017, and ITF Congress in 2018.

ith the welfare of women transport workers in mind, some 30 ITF Women Committee members got together on 17 and 18 October 2016 to discuss methods of improvement. Topics examined ranged from the ITF Congress work priority programmes, to using social media to strengthen campaigns that could end violence against the workers.

The committee also held a roundtable discussion with the Panama union affiliates, and brainstormed ideas for the 2017 International Women's Day and ITF Women's Conference.

The SOS Study Grant presentation has become an indispensable part of SOS tradition. Today, even though the number of study grant recipients has decreased, SOS remains committed to help its members defray the necessary expenses incurred in their children's education.



This year, the total value of study grants and best awards disbursed was S\$41,250. This was supported by the NTUC U Care Education Co-Funding Scheme. Through this scheme, U Care Fund provided funding support to the Union to reach out to more beneficiaries.

With the termination of SPF Scheme, all SOS SPF members can come forward to apply for withdrawal from their SPF account.

Documents to be submitted for SPF withdrawal

Please note that:

a) The following are the documents required for withdrawal applications:

- i) ALL CASES Mandatory documents as follows:
 - Completed original withdrawal form with signatures of claimant and witness.
 - Passport Current and previous copies showing bio-data and signature pages (if available).
 - Seamen book Current and previous copies showing bio-data & sailing period
 - Birth certificate copy or equivalent
 - Any form of photo ID copy (e.g.: driving licence, library card, Identification card, residential card)

Secondary documents (if members cannot provide all the mandatory supporting documents due to loss of documents):

- SOS Membership Card
- Seamen card
- ii) **DECEASED CASES** Additional mandatory supporting documents as follows:
 - Death certificate copy
 - Lawyer letter to prove claimant as the duly authorised nominee of the Participant, his assign or success or in title or such legal representative duly recognised in law applicable to the Participant;
 - Marriage certificate copy (if claimant is the spouse of deceased)
 - Birth certificate copy (if claimant is the parent/ child /sibling of deceased)
 - Claimant passport copy
- b) All documents, except withdrawal forms, must be certified as true copies. The signature of the claimant in the withdrawal form must be witnessed by one of the following groups of people:
 - Justice of Peace
 - Public Notary
 - Lawyer
 - Document Issuing Authorities
 - SOS / Seacare Regional Offices (if applicable)
- c) All forms and supporting documents must be submitted by post or in person.

JOURNEY OF A SEAFARING COOK

or SOS member Neo Keng Hwee, seafaring is probably
the most extraordinary job he has ever experienced.

The 39-year-old, who has fanned a passion for cooking since young, recently completed his 15-month stint as a Second Cook from Posh Fleet Services. He found the opportunity to travel the world while undergoing culinary training too attractive to resist, and enrolled into the SOS-initiated Seafaring Cooks Place-and-Train Programme in late 2014.

Keng Hwee's services have brought him on memorable voyages to different parts of the world such as Shanghai, Vancouver and Mauritius, and resulted in him sailing on board vessels like Salvanguard, Terasea Falcon, and Salviscount. He mused, "How many Singaporeans my age would dare to leave their comfort zones to experience life as a seafaring cook?"



You must change your mindset. Working in the galley is different from working in restaurants on shore, where you can easily replenish your stocks. On ships, cooking is another adventure altogether.

The former kitchen assistant recounted his daily schedule of waking up at 4am to prepare breakfast and commencing his lunch preparation by 7.30am.

"I took a while to adapt. I had sea sickness initially, especially when rough weather lasted for days. Thankfully, all my crewmates took care of me and made me feel at home."

"What I enjoyed most was the chance to work under chief cooks from different countries, such as Indonesia and the Philippines. I sought their advice on whipping up their national delicacies," he added.

Keng Hwee, who often makes pastries and preserved dishes for the crew in his spare time, said different cooks have various styles and preferences that call for greater flexibility in the galley.

"There may not be a one-size-fits-all approach or rigid cooking methods to follow, but creativity is a must if you want to turn limited ingredients into delicious, healthy meals," he said.

A FRESH TAKE ON SEACARE TRADEPLUS

Singapore has one of the highest seafood consumption rates in the world per capita, with its people consuming 22 kilograms of seafood yearly – 2 kilograms more than the global average.

Its import of chilled and frozen salmon, cod, tuna and live and frozen lobsters, among others, comes from reputable fish farms and fisheries from countries such as Norway, Australia, Scotland and Canada. The company's global network ensures the yearlong availability of seafood and prevents price fluctuations.

To encourage sustainable consumption of seafood, Seacare TradePlus is looking to increasing the import of farmed fish as a more ecologically sustainable alternative to the rapidly declining fish population in the wild. Farmed fish also costs less due to steadier and more dependable supplies.

Typically, the farmed seafood will bear "Responsibly Farmed" and "ASC/MSC certified" labels.
