From the thunderous applause that broke out at the NTUC Industrial Relations and Membership Workshop, it was crystal clear that the Unions are all out to support President S R Nathan's second term as the country's head of state.

Attending the Workshop on 19 July 2005 at Orchid Country Club as a special quest, Mr. Nathan was heartened by the unionists' warm welcome.

"I am overwhelmed by all the kind words that have been expressed and the strong expressions of support for me to contest in the forthcoming Presidential Elections." he told the over 500 union leaders attending the Workshop.

The President commended the labour movement for the tremendous effort and good work put into protecting workers' interests. He also called upon all union leaders to follow the footsteps of earlier-day unionists and emulate their "cando" fighting spirit and determination when confronting our problems and helping workers.

The SOS leaders were among the unionists who were present. SOS General Secretary Mr Leow Ching Chuan, President Mr Tan Jing Bock, Vice President Mr Mohd Idris, Executive Secretary Mr Kam Soon Huat, Asst Secretary Mr Mohamad Abu Bakar, Treasurer Mr David Sim and Industrial Relations Executive Mr. Daniel Tan were among the union leaders who back President Nathan's bid for the second term in office. They agreed with NTUC Secretary-General Mr Lim Boon Heng's description of Mr Nathan as an outstanding, honourable and selfless President in the last six years.



At the workshop, Mr Lim recounted how Mr Nathan had used his office to help the poor, such as pushing for the President's Challenge fund-raising efforts with all his energy. The initiative has benefited tens of thousands of Singaporeans every year.

"Forgive us for being a little selfish - because we look forward to you raising more funds for the poor in the next six years!" Mr Lim said.

"We are very happy that you have decided to stand for re-election, even though you deserve to enjoy a rest, after such a long and distinguished career!"

Mr Lim described Mr Nathan, 81, as a good example of how despite his age, he could still take on the responsibilities of the country's highest office.

Seacare Co-operative Ltd was jointly launched in May 1994 by the Singapore Organisation of Seamen and the National Trades Union Congress as a co-operative platform to promote the welfare of Singapore seamen. This is clearly reflected in Seacare's statement of founding mission "to help and benefit Singapore seamen and their families through more work opportunities and appropriate investment projects".

Since its founding, Seacare has always sought to balance its need to be economically viable as a co-operative enerprise against its aim of helping Singapore seamen as job seekers or consumers. As a means of ensuring viability, Seacare incorporates companies within its co-operative framework for greater effectiveness in conducting its business activities.

As at 31 March 2005, the Seacare Group consists of Seacare Co-operative Ltd and its two holding companies Seacare Holdings Pte Ltd and Seacare Foundation Pte Ltd respectively with six and eight subsidiary companies. "Times have changed; our local seafarers now find it hard to land jobs on board ships, especially our older seamen. In the past, a simple education would have sufficed. Now, we need to train to stay employable."

For this reason, Mr Said embraces continual upgrading and retraining of members. He pointed out that in the past, gaining experience was one of the few ways to improve oneself, and many workers tended to assume that once they started working, schooling was over and "out of question". In a volatile and dynamic economy, training has become a necessity, if we want to move with the times.

He should know better. After all, he has been attending training courses on a regular basis. A fine example of never-too-old to learn, he had signed up for many courses. From computer skills to PSA courses such as operating a forklift and Stevedoring when he was 40, to completing the course on becoming a Lifting Supervisor at age 52, Safety and Lifting Supervisor at age 55, amongst many others.

On 23 June 2005, Mr Said retired and stepped down from the EXCO. "I can spend more time with my family now. You know. my daughter has been receiving SOS education grant every year since she was in Primary One. She's going to begin her medical studies in the NUS soon!" He also has a 15 year old daughter in Secondary Three.

"I thank SOS and all the members, who are all my friends, for all the memories. I'm glad to have the honour of standing tall with the rest of you through the ups and downs." He urged the members to "continue to trust and support the Union". His message to his comrades - "Do continue the good work for our members because they are counting on us."

Seacare Environmental Goes

Seen anything like this before?


Don't be mistaken, this is not just any fanciful patterns on the roof top. These are real plants and greenery. growing and very much alive. And right at our doorstep in Singapore too! AND, if you have not already realised. what you see in the picture is a roof top garden from a HDB carpark in Punggol.

Seacare Environmental Pte Ltd is looking into working with Garden and Landscape Centre (GLC) and RE Holdings, to produce, market and implement roof garden projects extensively in Singapore.

"We are in discussion with the various parties but we are keen to explore its potential in Singapore. After all, many roofs in Singapore are still 'bare'," said Mr Abdul Kader, Deputy Chairman, Seacare Environmental Pte Ltd.

Rooftop gardens are man-made green spaces on the topmost levels of industrial, commercial and residential structures. They may be designed to grow produce, provide play space, give shade and shelter, or simply be a lifestyle, green area. Green roofs help moderate temperatures, improve air quality, reduce storm-water runoff and create habitat for birds and butterflies. Such sky-high greeneries indeed can offer respite from the city bustle.

Many of us would not have known it to be possible to plant a garden in space-challenged Singapore, let alone on top of a HDB block. Much as this idea may be a novelty for Singaporeans, roof top garden projects have very much taken off in other countries. As of 1 April 2000, the Japanese Government has stipulated that new public and private commercial developments with roof areas of over 250 square metres and 1,000 square metres respectively are expected to green a minimum of 20 percent of any flat roof area.



Green and Hits the Roof

Rooftop gardens are a hit with urban residents across the world and Seacare Environmental believes that it will be popular in Singapore too.

"We are also in the preliminary stages of gaining a better understanding of how to install and utilise roof gardens at this point. If found to be workable, we hope to propose the conversion of the roofs of residential blocks, existing carparks and such, into green roofs,"

GLC will be imparting the necessary knowledge and skills in installing the roof garden in the initial stages. Essential know-how will include understanding the nature of various types of plants, knowing the suitability of the plants for a roof garden, and of course, the technicalities involved with setting up a roof garden from scratch. Certainly, Singapore's climate plays a big consideration in the types of foliage that can be planted.

Mr Abdul Kader reinforced: "Such extensive gardens require minimal maintenance and behave as another form of roofing material. Ultimately, what we are looking at is improving air quality and lowering temperatures, especially in sunny and humid Singapore. Installing gardens and green spaces upon the roof spaces of buildings will be a great boost to improving the environment, and perhaps even offering residents an alternative 'get-away' at that too!"

Indeed, Housing Board Development (HDB), Building and Construction Authority (BCA), Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) and National Parks (NParks) have already been working together to encourage deployment of such roof gardens in Singapore.

- Reduces/retards the release of excessive rain water by approximately 30%.
