

Smartphone training: mastering WhatsApp and Facebook


The Seacare Maritime Hall became a bustling hub of digital enlightenment as SOS organised an engaging smartphone training workshop for members on Jul 22

THE THEME WILL SERVE AS THE

CENTREPIECE for the World Maritime Day celebrations on Sep 26, 2024. The occasion is doubly significant as it coincides with the golden jubilee of the 1974 SOLAS Convention — an instrumental accord that has shaped the IMO's safety protocols for maritime operations.

'Navigating the future: safety first!' encapsulates the IMO's unwavering dedication to enhancing maritime safety and security, all while conscientiously safequarding our oceans.

The theme also highlights IMO's proactive approach to staying ahead of technological shifts, thereby ensuring that maritime regulations adapt and evolve in tandem.

IMO Secretary-General Kitack Lim expressed his thoughts: "This theme

would allow us to focus on the full range of safety regulatory implications arising from new and adapted technologies and the introduction of alternative fuels, including measures to reduce GHG emissions from ships as IMO strives to ensure the safety and efficiency of shipping are maintained, and potentially improved so that the flow of seaborne international trade continues to be smooth and efficient."

The 2024 theme aligns with the UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and several other Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), including SDG 7, 8, 9, 13, and 14, focusing on clean energy, sustainable economic growth, resilient infrastructure, climate change action, and sustainable use of marine resources. 5

Hong Kong Convention ratified, set to enter into force in 2025

Convention marks a game-changing moment for ship recycling, setting a global standard for safety and environmental responsibility

THE HONG KONG INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION FOR THE SAFE AND ENVIRONMENTALLY SOUND RECYCLING OF SHIPS (HKC) is set to enter into force on Jun 26, 2025, after the ratification by Bangladesh and Liberia, two pivotal players in the maritime world.

The HKC, adopted at a diplomatic conference held in Hong Kong, China in 2009, aims to ensure that ships, when recycled after reaching the end of their operational lives, do not pose any unnecessary risks to human health, safety and the environment.

IMO stated that the HKC embraces the 'cradle to grave' concept, addressing

all environmental and safety aspects relating to ship recycling, including the responsible management and disposal of associated waste streams in a safe and environmentally sound manner.

"The convention places responsibilities and obligations on all parties concerned – including shipowners, shipbuilding yards, ship recycling facilities, flag States, port States, and recycling States."

IMO stated that ships to be sent for recycling

would be required to carry onboard an inventory of hazardous materials. Ship recycling facilities authorised by competent authorities would also be required to provide a Ship Recycling Plan, specific to individual vessel to be recycled. Additionally, governments would be required to ensure that recycling facilities under their jurisdiction comply with the convention.

Secretary-General Kitack Lim of the IMO commended Bangladesh and Liberia for ratifying HKC. Mr Lim emphasised that the convention's entry into force is a 'momentous day' for the maritime industry and particularly for ship recycling countries.

Uptick in armed robbery in Singapore Straits in first half of 2023



The ReCAAP Information Sharing Centre (ISC) has unveiled its 2023 Half-Year Report, spotlighting a troubling uptick in piracy and armed robbery against ships in Asia. The Straits of Malacca and Singapore (SOMS) are particularly affected

OUT OF 59 REPORTED INCIDENTS, 38 TOOK PLACE IN THE SINGAPORE

STRAIT — a 41 per cent increase from the first half of 2022. Notably, two-thirds of the targeted ships were bulk carriers in transit. A staggering 87 per cent of these incidents occurred under the cover of darkness, between 1800 to 0559 hrs. The primary targets for theft included ship stores, scrap metal, and machinery parts.

Most attacks exploited vulnerable ships — those ill-prepared, with low freeboards, and moving slowly in SOMS's restricted zones. The assailants typically employ a non-confrontational, 'hit-and-run' strategy. In 42 per cent of the Singapore Strait incidents, either nothing was stolen or losses remain unquantifiable. The remaining 58 per cent involved thefts of engine parts, ship stores, and unsecured items.

ReCAAP ISC Executive Director.

Mr Krishnaswamy Natarajan, said "The increase in incidents in the Straits of Malacca and Singapore is likely due to the socio-economic situation worsened by the pandemic, lower fish catch due to climate change as also the prevailing Southwest monsoon. These factors may have led the locals of the Strait to turn to sea robbery and petty crimes to make ends meet. I urge the law enforcement agencies of coastal States to enhance surveillance, increase patrols and respond promptly to reports of incidents."

In response to the rise in piracy incidents in SOMS, ReCAAP ISC has been actively engaging the littoral States of the SOMS, the shipping industry, and relevant agencies to discuss ways to enhance cooperation and information sharing to expedite operational response to deter sea robbery incidents in the SOMS.



IBF deal finalised: 250,000 seafarers to receive 6 per cent pay raise

In a landmark agreement, the International Bargaining Forum (IBF) has secured a four-year deal promising wage hikes and improved working conditions for over 250,000 seafarers serving on more than 10,000 vessels.

THE PACT WAS SIGNED IN BERLIN, GERMANY, IN SEPTEMBER, with maritime stakeholders and union representatives, including SOS President Kam Soon Huat and HR & Policy Manager Eugene Guo.

Seafarers will benefit from a 6 per cent wage increase over two years: 4 per cent starting Jan 1, 2024, and an additional 2 per cent from Jan 1, 2025. The 2026-27 pay deal and cost items will be negotiated in 2025.

Safety and Harassment

The agreement includes ILO Convention 190, aiming to eliminate workplace violence, discrimination and harassment. There was also a joint recognition of the importance of safe working practices in cargo lashing in the common fight against malpractice.

A new working group was also established to address industry challenges, technology shifts, alternative fuels and ensure a just transition as the industry responds to climate change.

Additional Provisions

The Joint Negotiating Group of Maritime Employers (JNG) committed to remind members to respect national cabotage laws and to work towards providing seafarers with free internet access.





In an era marked by swift tech innovations, seafarers are urging for a transparent, worker-led approach to incorporating autonomous ships into commercial fleets

A JOINT STUDY BY THE KOREA MARITIME INSTITUTE, ITF, AND KOREA INSTITUTE OF MARITIME AND FISHERIES TECHNOLOGY

underscores the irreplaceable role of human expertise in the sector, even as automation gains ground.

The study, based on in-depth interviews with 17 maritime experts, indicates that seafarers see the rise of Maritime Autonomous Surface Ships (MASS) as a boon, not a bane. They believe the tech leap could address various issues, from safety to environmental sustainability. However, they caution the need for transparent, reliable technology backed by government and corporate

supervision.

ITF Seafarers'
Section Chair
David Heindel
notes that while
full automation
is on the horizon,
it's not imminent.
He believes the
gradual uptick
in automation

levels will not jeopardise jobs but will enhance safety and work quality. This, he says, positions the industry better to confront challenges like climate change.

The report also forecasts a sustained need for maritime skills until at least 2040, despite the gradual introduction of automation. It highlights immediate concerns, such as seafarers' well-being and the necessity for training in new tech.

Heindel adds that the maritime industry is at a pivotal stage, balancing tech evolution with the urgent need for sustainable energy. He champions the inclusion of seafarers' perspectives for a worker-led, equitable tech transition. Their firsthand experience, he contends, is vital for ensuring that tech upgrades maintain or even elevate work conditions at sea.

The findings were shared at the 107th session of the IMO Safety Committee, setting the stage for debates on competencies needed for emerging roles like remote navigation.

SOS delegation forges bilateral ties with **NCSU**, visits Evergreen **Training Center**

SOS delegates comprising President Kam Soon Huat, AS Norani Mohamad Rais and IRO Alan Kor visited the National Chinese Seamen's Union (NCSU) in Taipei in August 2023

THE VISIT AIMED TO STRENGTHEN **BILATERAL TIES** between the two maritime trade unions, particularly in the

post-pandemic context.

During the visit, NCSU provided an overview of its history, welfare schemes and pandemic response measures. Both parties engaged in constructive

discussions, exploring opportunities for future collaboration and sharing best practices.


